NEXT TO THE HIGH LINE AT WEST 22ND STREET

New York, NY (February 27, 2017) – Presented by Friends of the High Line, High Line Art is pleased to announce a new High Line Commission by Los Angeles-based artist Henry Taylor. Titled *the floaters*, this large-scale mural will be hand-painted by a professional sign company, Colossal Media, on the wall of a building overlooking the High Line at West 22nd Street, and will be visible from the park as well as the street below. Previously, this location presented works by Barbara Kruger (2016), Kerry James Marshall (2015), and Ed Ruscha (2014). Taylor's commission will be on view from March 17, 2017 to March 2018.

Henry Taylor is a painter known for his intimate depictions of people, capturing a wide range of subjects that span from his close friends and family, to strangers whose appearances strike him, to celebrities within the African American community. His color-blocked compositions evoke compassion and a sense of shared space, setting the viewer in close conversation with those pictured.





For the High Line, Taylor presents a new version of a self-portrait adapted specifically for its setting on the side of a building at West 22nd Street. The work depicts the artist and a friend “blissed out,” relaxing in a swimming pool at a friend’s house in Palm Springs. Reminiscent of David Hockney’s paintings of Los Angeles swimming pools from the 1960s, *the floaters*, a title which references the eponymous Detroit R&B group, portrays the artist in a moment of pure, leisurely happiness. Cecilia Alemani, the Donald R. Mullen, Jr. Director & Chief Curator of High Line Art says, “We’re excited to host Taylor’s first ever public art work on the High Line. Through his portraits, Taylor brings us into his own personal circle in Los Angeles of neighbors, friends, and idols. His use of color and method of arranging shapes elevate the everyday into another majestic realm. With *the floaters*, Taylor brings a slice of laidback West Coast living to the bustling streets of New York City.”

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Henry Taylor (b. 1958, Ventura, California) lives and works in Los Angeles. Recent solo exhibitions have been presented internationally at venues including The Mistake Room, Guadalajara, Mexico (2016); MoMA PS1, New York (2012); Santa Monica Museum of Art, Los Angeles (2008); and The Studio Museum in Harlem, New York (2007). Taylor’s work has been included in group exhibitions at institutions including The Institute of Contemporary Art, Boston (2017); Camden Arts Centre, London, United Kingdom (2016); Stedelijk Museum voor Aktuele Kunst, Ghent, Belgium (2016); and Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles (2012). His work is featured in the Whitney Biennial, Whitney Museum of American Art, New York (2017).
